A few years ago we go to watch Canadian Lisa Jowett from (Avalonis Kennel in Calgary)` Alberta, with her beautiful dog Boreas compete and win the breed at Westminster.



It is such a great honour (or so I am told) to make it to a show such as Westminster or Crufts so when you see a dog there, you know that a lot of hard work and determination has gone in to the breeding and showing of that dog.

we set off in early March to make our way to Birmingham. We Landed at Gatwick Airport resting overnight before setting off via the Gatwick express to London to catch the train to Birmingham.

Terriers were not to be judged until the Sunday, so we spent Thursday checking out the vendors and other activities that were going on. Five halls full of Judging rings, booths with all manner of dog related goods, rings with demonstrations of dog abilities, and displays of different dog breeds.





Regular cleaning of the ear canal is an

As dog owners you should be inspecting your dog's ears weekly to make sure they are healthy and clean. It is important to regularly handle the dogs ears so you become familiar with how the ear canals look and smell they by making it easier to notice an irregularity.

Regular ear examinations also help to train the dog to accept ear exams as a part of life. This way if an ear infection does happen, it will be easier to treat and not as traumatic for the pet.

If your dogs ears are excessively red, dirty, smelly, painful, or if the dog is scratching at their ears or rubbing them, or twitching and shaking their head, you should contact your veterinarian for diagnosis and treatment.


To effectively clean your dog's ears you pour a small amount of ear clean into the canal. While holding the ear flap, you gently massage the base of the ear. Using a cotton pad wipe out the excess ear cleaner and debris. Your dog will shake its head to help remove the solution. If you dogs ears are not excessively dirty, you may choose to clean them with a cotton pad drenched in ear cleaner and follow up with a dry cotton pad to remove the excess.

OTITIS EXTERNA:

Otitis Externa is defined as inflammation of the external ear canal

Occasionally after a professional grooming some pets seem to 'develop' ear infections. Some pets will excessively rub or scratch at their ears and/or shake their heads. The pets that commonly exhibit these symptoms are the ones that came into the grooming shop with early signs of Otitis Externa or pets that are predisposed to overgrowth of bacteria or yeast in their ear canals.

During the grooming procedure, your pets ears were thoroughly cleaned out and (for breeds that require it) some hairs plucked from the ear canal. Some irritation from plucking the ear hair out or cleaning the ears may occur; perpetuating the onset of a



bacterial overgrowth and/or leading to the 'itch and scratch' cycle.

It is very important that you not allow your sealy to excessively scratch or rub at his/

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her ears, as this will cause damage to the sensitive skin of the outer ear canal. Also beware of allowing the dogs to dig their nails into the ear canal to scratch and damage the sensitive ear canal.

PRIMARY CAUSES OF OTITIS EXTERNA:

- ◆ Parasites such as earmites, mange or ticks
- ◆ Allergies which is the most common cause of otitis externa in dogs. Allergies include: contact allergies, flea allergy dermatitis and atopy, the allergic disease caused by pollen and mold, or food allergy (most common of the allergies!)
- ◆ Foreign Bodies such as plant material or seeds (stickers from grasses or weeds like fox tails)
- ◆ Other Dermatologic disease any dermatologic disease that effects the ear flaps can lead to inflammation in the external ear canal. Auto-immune diseases can cause severe scaling, crusting, and ulceration of the pinna (ear flaps) and external ear canal.
- ◆Glandular disorders and viral diseases
- ◆High levels of yeast or bacteria.

To Pluck or not to Pluck, that is the question.

There has been a lot of debate as to wether a dogs require ear plucking. Many Veterinarians and many groomers have differing opinions, so i will leave that decision up to you as the dog owner.

If you do choose to pluck your dogs ears, please only pluck a few hairs at a time and do it on a regular basis. If you pluck a lot of hair out at one time you can cause irritation to the skin of the ear canal that can lead to itch scratch cycle etc.

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My first trip to the Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show in New York City



It all started with an image I saw on Facebook in mid January, 2020.

A beautiful Sealyham. An exquisite head. An intelligent expression.

I wrote to the owner, asking a bit about this lovely dog. (Am.Grand Champion Afterglow's Sir Bedivere. Call name Bogart)

A dialogue ensued between myself and Pam Page, the dog's owner.



Within a few minutes I had decided I NEEDED to go to Westminster to cheer these two on.

I booked a hotel. Reserved the airplane tickets. I went online to buy tickets and they were SOLD OUT! A month in advance! I was beginning to realize what a BIG deal Westminster really was.

No matter. I was going to Westminster with or without a ticket.

New York City February 10th:

I set my alarm for 5 am. (That is 2 am for we Vancouverites). I jumped out of bed. I was aiming to be THE FIRST person in line at the Piers. The weather was unseasonably warm. Light drizzle in mid February in New York. Unheard of. It was a short 15 minute walk from my hotel near Times Square. With each block I grew more excited.

At 7 am, I was indeed the first person at the ticket booth. I had prepared an academy award performance of pleading and begging to get a ticket. Unneeded. Thankfully, the

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WKC reserves a certain amount of tickets to be purchased on site. (They were sold out by 8 am.) I thought I had won the lottery! Even though the show would not start for another two hours most of the exhibitors were already at their benches. The souvenir shop was open for business.

The show was nowhere near starting and you could feel the energy. The carpeting was brand new. Thick. Plush. Purple and gold. I had only been to dog shows where they seemingly had just finished a rodeo before they started the dog show. I had never seen a carpet at a dog show. It made everything very quiet. Everything was very posh and hushed. It felt like Sotheby's.

The benching area was surreal. Rollers, curling irons, hair spray, hair product, blow dryers, big mirrors, small mirrors, false eyelashes, perfume. Not only were the dogs being groomed, the handlers were grooming each other! Everybody looked great sitting there in rollers, putting on make up, beautifully dressed.

The crowds started piling into the venue. The chairs around the show rings were filling up. Spectators were seasoned Westminster-ites. They claimed their seats early and then did not move all day. As much as I loved seeing the dogs, the people watching was unparalleled. The rich, the famous and the infamous.

The furs, the diamonds, the jewellery, the haute couture, the plastic surgery, the plumped up lips, the cheek filler on both men and women. My head was spinning.

I secured a ringside seat with a good view into all show rings. First up were the Poodles. When Siba (Grand Champion Ch. Stone Run Afternoon Tea) walked in she turned everybody's head. Even if you knew zero about Poodles, you could tell this was a special dog. (Spoiler Alert) She went on to win Best in Show.

The Terriers were up next.

At this point my reporting skills went into the toilet. I became an octopus of camera, binoculars and notepad. Nothing got noted terribly well because I was besotted with the terriers. Terriers I have not seen at a show or otherwise for years. Decades. Bedlington terriers. Skye terriers. Norwich and Norfolk terriers. A feast for the eyes.

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Then came the Sealyham Terriers.

Seven of them.

I lost my mind with the beauty.

Exquisite. Elegant. Distinctive.

This is such a notable breed. Long square heads. Their falls and their full beards. Full furnishings. They are nothing short of STUNNING.

It was a blurry dream of movement. Reach and drive. Flowing furnishings. Wagging tails.



How was the judge going to decide? In front of him were the best of the best. Each dog so close to perfection.

The selection was made.

Number 10.

Grand Champion CH. Forlegd Steezy Hans Solo was chosen Best of Breed for Westminster 2020.

After the Sealyhams left the ring, I made my way over to where Pam Page was sitting with her breeder Lisa Inman Lee, and Bev Thompson (Sealyham owner, enthusiast and friend of the breed). I was so happy to meet these lovely women.

From that point on time just sped up.

It was 4 or 5 pm.

We went back to the benching area to debrief and offer congratulations all around. Bogart has won an Award of Merit. The merriment was far too short as the evening events were about to start at MADISON SQUARE GARDENS.

Terrier Group judging was about to begin.

(When do the handlers eat????)

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There was no time to socialize with my new friends. I literally ran to the Gardens. It brought back memories to when I saw the Roman Coliseum for the first time. Looming in the horizon. Getting bigger with every step as I got closer.

Madison Square Gardens and The Empire State Building were lit up in the official colours of the Westminster Kennel Club. Purple and gold. It was magical.

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I was in tears.

What a beautiful speech to end a wonderful event.

I have a few take aways from my time at this dog show in New York City:

The handlers, not only the dogs, are athletes!

The show ring at the Gardens looked to be the size of a soccer pitch. The handlers were running at top speed on concrete around and around and around.

And when do they eat?

My hat goes off to these handlers. This is a tough job. Someone should make a documentary following handlers. Week after week on the road and then all the work in between.



The people of New York were so warm, so friendly and so very helpful.

So many people stopped me on the street to comment on my jacket (see the photo attached. It has dogs on it. It is 30 years old). Clerks in stores asked why I was in New York. As soon as I said why, they would come back with hilarious dog show gossip.

I have travelled the world as an international flight attendant. This week in New York was probably one of the highlights of my life.

None of this would have happened had I not been besotted by a little photo of a beautiful Sealyham named Bogie.
